PRESENT PERFECT CONTINUOUS TENSE

Positive

He She It	+	has been	+	playing	» 1st form of verb + '-ing' »
<hr/>					
I You We You They	+	have been	+	playing	» 1st form of verb + '-ing' »

Example: They have been playing football.

Negative

He She It	+	has not been hasn't been	+	playing	» 1st form of verb + '-ing' »
<hr/>					
I You We You They	+	have not been haven't been	+	playing	» 1st form of verb + '-ing' »

Example: They have not (haven't) been playing football.

Question

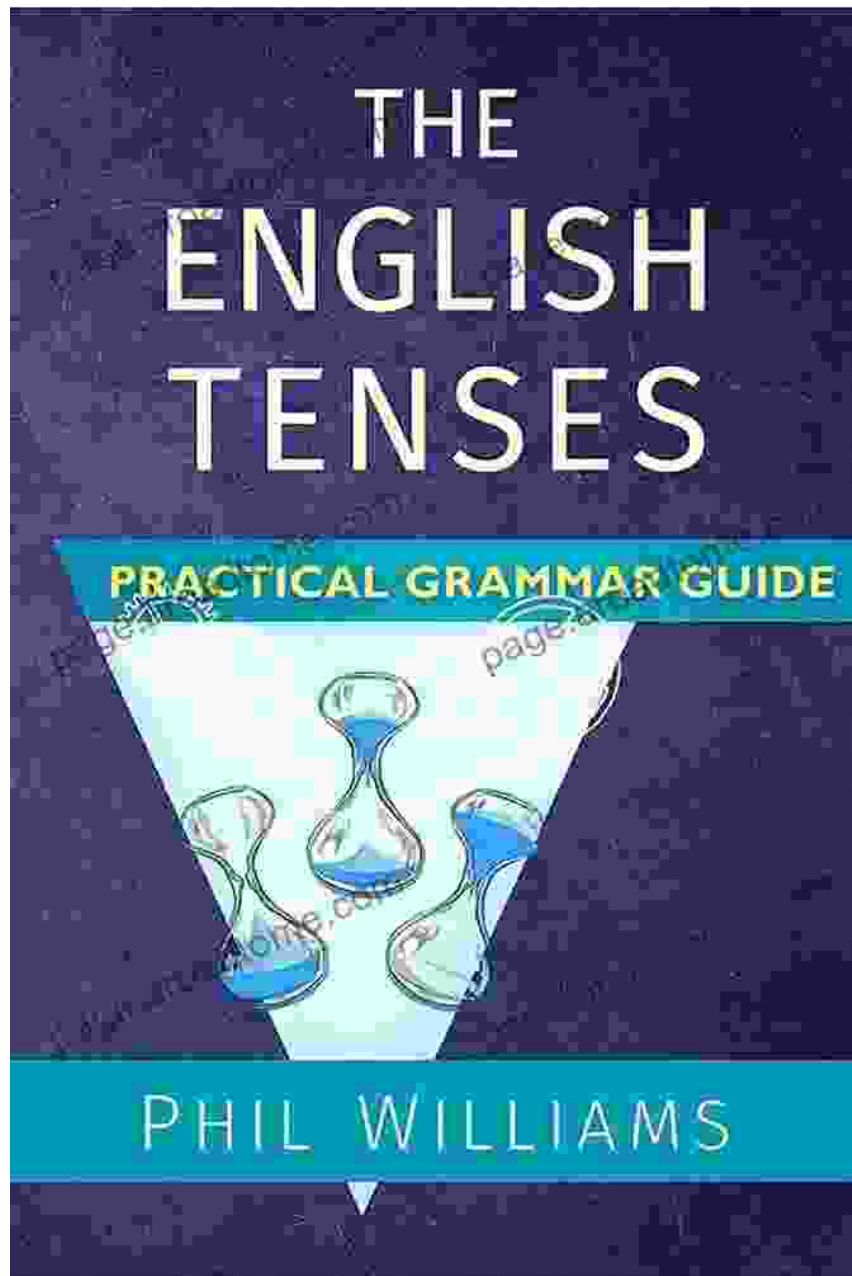
Has been	+	He She It	+	playing	» 1st form of verb + '-ing' »

Example: Have they been playing football?

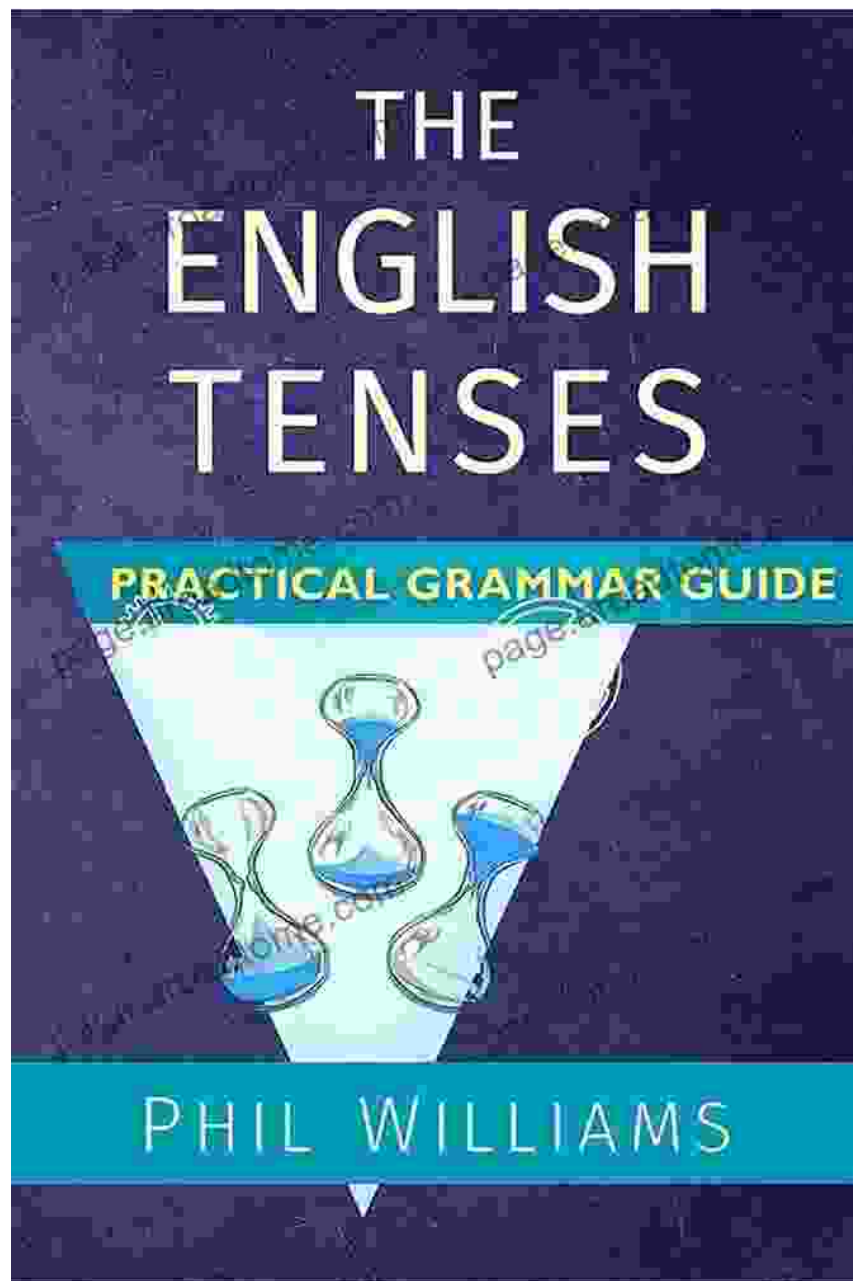

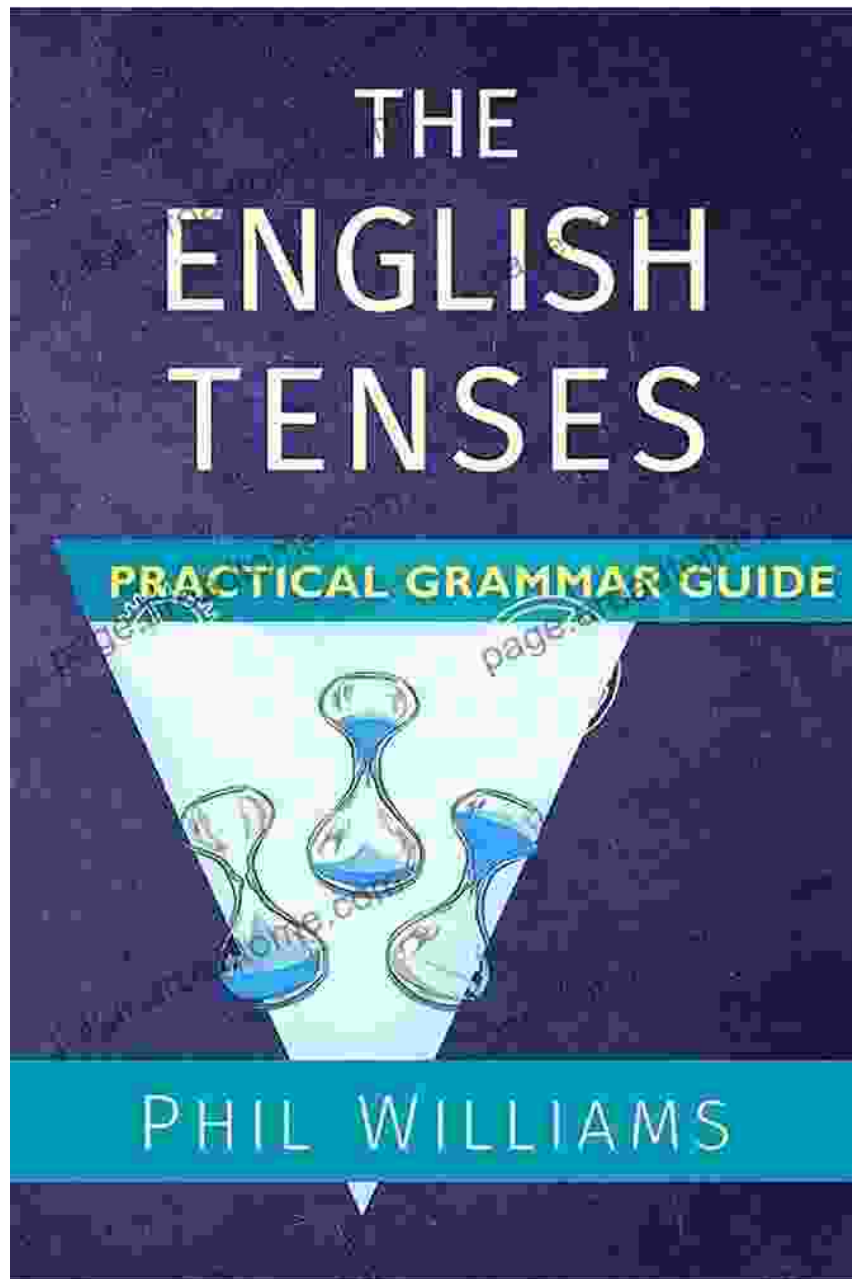

PAST PERFECT CONTINUOUS

Past Perfect Continuous Tense indicates a past action which started in the past and continued to happen after another action and time in the past.

Forms

- + S + had been + V-ing + 0.
- S + hadn't been + V-ing + 0.
- ? Had + S + been + V-ing + 0?

Negative (-)

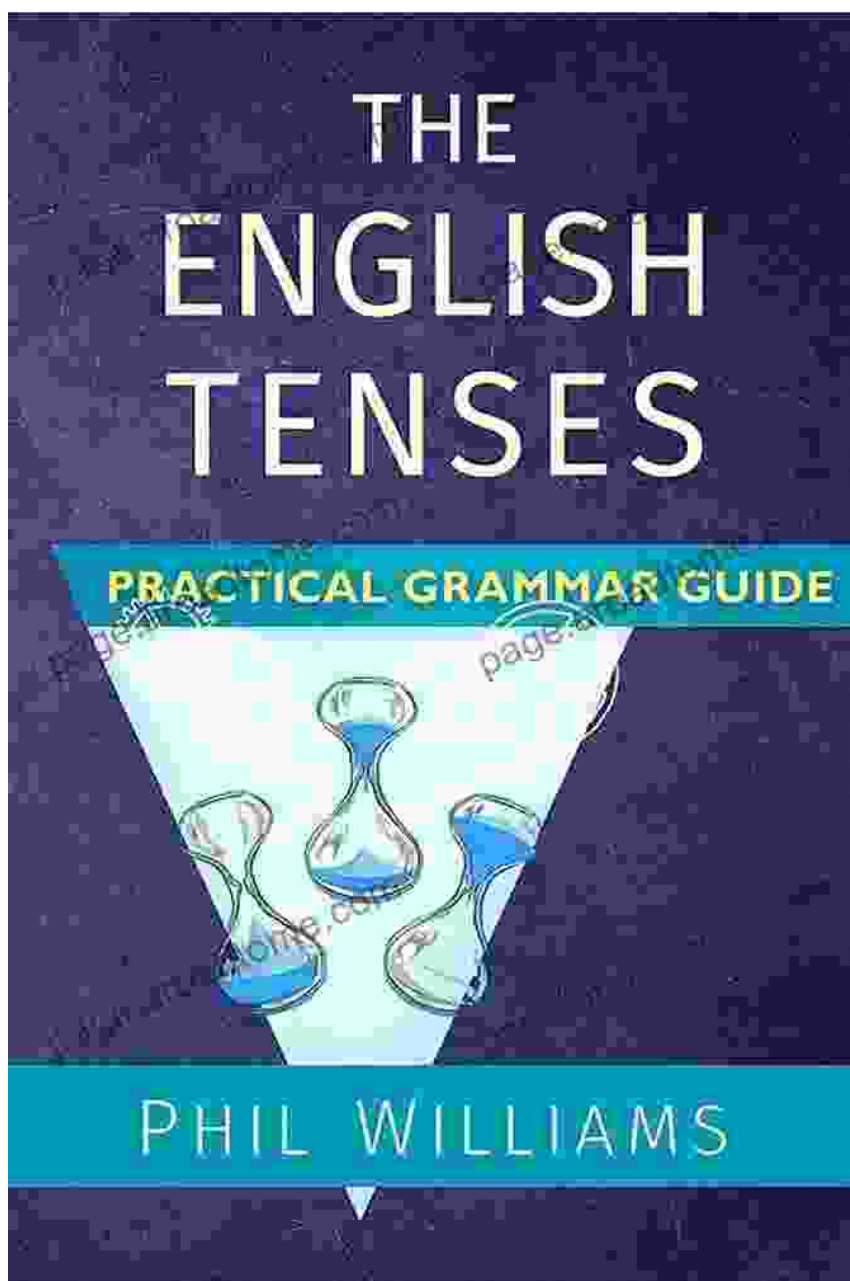
Interrogative (?)

You had been running.	You hadn't been running.	Had you been running?
He had been running.	He hadn't been running.	Had he been running?
She had been running.	She hadn't been running.	Had she been running?
It had been running.	It hadn't been running.	Had It been running?
They had been running.	They hadn't been running.	Had they been running?
We had been running.	We hadn't been running.	Had we been running?

FUTURE CONTINUOUS TENSE



+ S + will + be + V-ing (present participle)
I will be singing in the concert tomorrow.

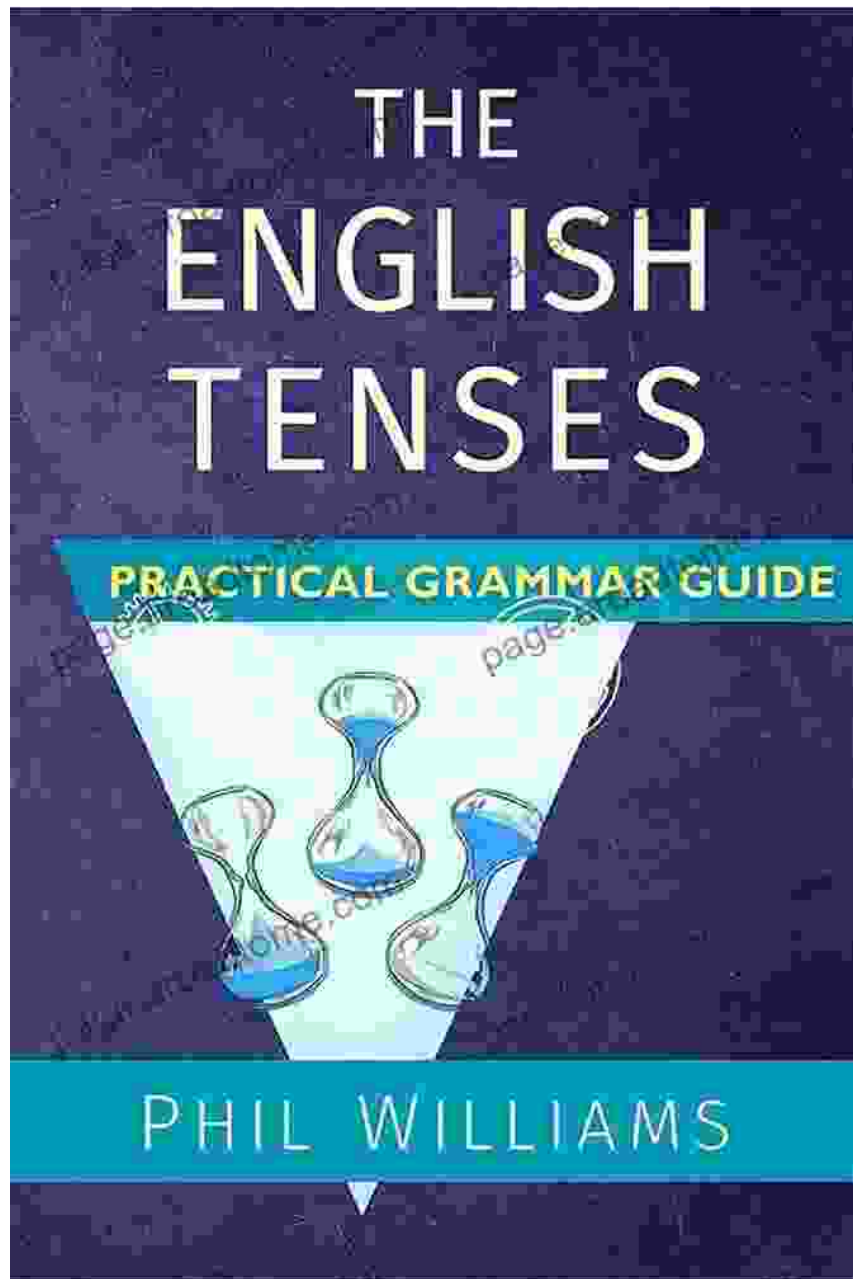
- S + will + not + be + V-ing (present participle)
I will not be singing in the concert tomorrow.

? Will + S + be + V-ing? (present participle)
Will you be singing in the concert tomorrow?

Usage	Example
To describe interrupted actions in the future	When you come tomorrow, they will be playing tennis.
To express actions in progress at a specific time in the future	At 12 o'clock tomorrow, we will be having lunch at school.
To refer to actions that are happening now and expected to continue in the future	Unfortunately, sea levels will still be rising in 20 years.
To ask a question politely about the future	Will you be bringing your friend to the party tonight?
To emphasize future plans and intentions	He'll be coming to visit us next week.
To describe atmosphere in the future	When I arrive at the party everybody will be celebrating, some will be dancing.
To express parallel actions or series of parallel actions in the future	She will be watching TV, and he will be cooking dinner.

FUTURE PERFECT CONTINUOUS

S + will + have + been + V-ing...
I will have been eating vegetables for three months.

S + will + not + have + been + V-ing...
I won't have been eating vegetables for three months.

?

Will + S + have + been + V-ing...?
Will you have been eating vegetables for three months?

Usage	Example
To show that something will continue up until a particular event or time in the future	James will have been teaching at the university for more than a year by the time he leaves for Asia.
To talk about something that finishes just before another time or action	I will be tired when I get home because I will have been walking for over an hour.



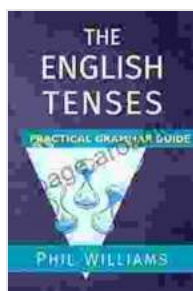

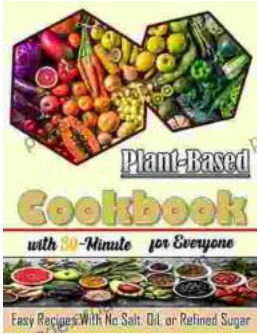


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
